Criminal Justice?

The criminal justice major will focus on law enforcement, the courts, and corrections in some detail. Students will learn about criminology, juvenile delinquency, serial murder and terrorism, to name a few. Some discussions involve controversial issues including the death penalty, treating violent juveniles as adults, and the distribution of justice in America. The program also offers additional preparation for later careers in administration and policy making. Academic development is emphasized, along with career preparation, to assist students in exploring career options.
