10. PRESIDENT'S REPORT

MG Boylan reported that the funding required from Georgia Military College for the completion of Usery Hall has been reduced from \$1.5 million to approximately \$250,000, which he expects will be requested from the Georgia Military College Foundation.

MG Boylan reported that enrollments at the Warner Robins campus are over 1,000 this quarter. He also reported that the Atlanta campus is growing rapidly.

MG Boylan has begun his fall legislative visits.

MG Boylan reported that installation of a new telephone system has been completed and that problems with the system are being resolved by staff in the Information Technology Department.

MG Boylan reported that plans for a new Columbus campus have been deferred as enrollments there are not increasing as anticipated.

MG Boylan invited the members of the Board to the Steinway Concert on Thursday, December 10, 2009, in the Goldstein Center for the Performing Arts and the President's Dinner on Friday, December 11, 2009, in the Legislative Chamber. Formal invitations will be mailed.

MG Boylan reported a good response to the piano concert which was held in the Legislative Chamber on October 8 in honor of Mrs. Beegee Baugh, who provided significant funding for the piano that was purchased for the Legislative Chamber.

GMC ENGINEERING UPDATE

Project: Prep School

Estimated Cost: \$21,605,000.00

Issues/Concerns:

- Skanska is on schedule. Recent rains have significantly impacted roof installation and drying in of the building
- Skanska expects to use some of their project contingency funds to expedite roofing
- Skanska has saved \$1.3 million on their contracted price to date
- These dollars have been returned to the project and will be used to upgrade some portions of the project and to increase the scope
- Skanska expects to be complete in May 2010
- We have selected a furniture vendor and are moving forward with FF&E
- We will require an estimated \$250,000 from GMC to complete the project

Recent projects include:

- Construction is underway on the expansion in Valdosta
- Warehouse is complete in the vicinity of the lower practice field. We are installing ventilation fans and grading outside as weather permits.
- Bulldog club new BBQ pit behind the Horace Ray Field House is almost complete
- Significant dressing room upgrade for Goldstein
- Added a bathroom backstage in Goldstein
- Key card swipe system installed in Baugh Barracks
- Repaired a drainage problem in front of admissions
- Several furniture projects in the Library
- Added additional lights to the towers on the soccer field

- Parking lot construction to facilitate the expansion in Warner Robins is underway and grading for the new building began last week
- Johnson Controls replaced a compressor under warranty on the NAB II chiller and this repair has eliminated our HVAC problems in NAB II

As well as many other maintenance projects around campus.

We are continuing to prepare for our EPA peer audit next week. Our peer auditors will be here Tuesday and Wednesday to inspect our facilities and review our programs. At the completion of the audit we will be required to submit a report to the EPA identifying any deficiencies. We will have 60 days after the submission of the report to correct all of the deficiencies. At the completion of our audit, we will be expected to begin an Environmental Management System (EMS) to oversee our current policies and programs. This system must have the following elements: Policy, Planning, Implementation and Operation, Checking and Corrective Action, and Management Review.

Discipline

Discipline continues to be closely monitored. 3 students, as compared to 4 this time last year, have been suspended.

Curriculum

The Georgia Performance Standards serve as the curriculum for middle and high school classes. Standards have been adopted for Physical Education (P.E.) and our teachers will be attending the training in October. Members of the faculty continue to attend training and workshops provided by the Georgia Department of Education and various other discipline specific organizations, such as The National Councils of Teachers of English/Math/Science/Social Studies.

The faculty participated in professional development from January until May with a study of instructional strategies based on Robert Marzano's book, *Classroom Instruction that Works*.

We continue to promote the use of critical thinking in the classrooms. Eight of our faculty members attended the GMC Critical Thinking and Socratic Questioning Conference led by Dr. Richard Paul.

We have adopted the Georgia Teacher Evaluation Program as the tool to evaluate our faculty. Inez Hawkins came and led the orientation session for our teachers so that they would be versed on this program. Implementation will begin SY 09-10.

SACS

The Prep school has been accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, which is now under the umbrella of Advance-Ed, for 89 years. In March we will have our 5-year on-site visit by an Accreditation Team. The entire faculty is serving on various committees in preparation for this visit.

Advanced Placement (AP) Classes

This year we have doubled our AP class offerings to include along with AP Statistics and AP Calculus, AP Biology and AP English Language and Composition/American Literature. AP Biology is a senior level course and AP English Language and Composition/American Literature is a junior level course. We have 29 seniors, 47% of the class, enrolled in AP courses, and we have 39 juniors, 62% of the class enrolled in an AP class. This means that 26% of our high school students are part of our AP Program. We are exploring our options for expansion of our AP Program to include history next year.

Joint Enrollment

This year we have 29 out of 61 seniors, 47% of the Senior Class, enrolled in Joint Enrollment classes through Georgia Military College.

HOPE Eligibility

For the Class of 2009, 40 of the 60 graduates, or 66%, were eligible for the HOPE Scholarship Program.

Seven Year Club

The Seven-Year Club recognizes students who have attended GMC since 6th grade. The class of 2009 had 39 members who have attended GMC for all seven years.

Duke TIP

The Duke University Talent Identification Program (Duke TIP) identifies gifted children and provides resources to nurture the development of these exceptionally bright youngsters. In order to qualify for this program, a student must have scored at the 95th percentile or higher on a grade-level standardized achievement, aptitude, or mental ability test. This year 19 GMC 7th graders qualified for Duke TIP.

Character Education Program

We are in the 3rd year of the expansion of our Character Education Program. We have been working toward applying to become a National School of Character, which we plan to do in December of 2010. This program is sponsored by the Character Education Partnership, and its goal is "to identify, honor, and showcase exemplars in character education and facilitate their leadership in mentoring others." Pam Grant and Kim Leben will be attending the Character Education Partnership National Conference in October.

We have added three new formal Character Education programs this year. The 6^{th} and 7^{th} graders are participating in programs designed by the Josephson Institute. The focus of the 6^{th} grade component is the "ConnectWith Character" program which introduces students to the six pillars of character. The focus of the 7^{th} grade component is the "Wise Lives" program which explores the choices great people in history made and applies those lessons to the lives of young people today. The $9^{th}-12^{th}$ grade students have participated in the "Winning With Character" program through their JROTC classes during the first quarter of the 09-10 school year.

Last spring, Col. Patrick Toffler, head of the U.S. Military Academy's Office of Institutional Research, and LT Col. Joe Doty, of the Army Center of Excellence for Professional Military Ethics, the United States Military Academy at West Point, visited GMC. They had the opportunity to learn about and evaluate the prep school's character education program. Both men had very favorable responses to our program, and were very impressed with its quality.

Band/Choral Program

GMC's band program, under the direction of Major Charlie Harbor, continues to grow and flourish. Currently, we have 67 members in our high school band and 135 middle school students who take band classes every day. Our high school band attended their first Marching Festival of the year in Hawkinsville the first of October and received a superior rating. They have plans to attend two more Marching Festivals in the upcoming months.

Major Christopher Graddick is our new choral director. He has already expanded the program with the addition of an 8th grade chorus. Both the 8th grade and the high school chorus have many performances planned for this school year. Two of the upcoming ones are performances for Veterans Day and Alumni Weekend. The GMC High School Chorus attended the High School Chorus Day at Georgia College and State University. This year the spring musical for the prep school will be *Into the Woods*.

Odyssey of the Mind

Odyssey of the Mind is an international program that involves students in grades K-12 and those in college in creative problem-solving. The students compete at regional, state, and world level tournaments. Three years ago, Emily Fairbrass brought the program to GMC middle school, coaching three teams of five to seven students. Last year, all three teams advanced to state finals and one team to World Finals. This year, we have added a high school team and Jennifer Duckworth, the 6th grade science teacher, will serve also serve as a coach.
