

MEETING: Board of Trustees, Georgia Military College, Usery Community Conference Room, Tuesday, April 30,

2018, 6 p.m.

PRESENT: Randall A. New, Chairman of the Board; Members: Mr. George Hogan Sr., Ms. Doris Renfroe, Mr. Mike

Cobb, Rev. Tony Fraley, Mr. Ken Vance, The Honorable Mary Parham-Copelan, LtGen William B.

Caldwell, IV, President of Georgia Military College; and other interested parties.

BUSINESS:

1. Chairman of the Board, Randall A. New, having declared a quorum to be present, called the meeting to order,

2. Chairman New asked for a motion for the minutes of the meeting on January 16, 2018 to be approved. Mr. Hogan made the motion, with Mr. Cobb seconding the motion. The minutes were approved by unanimous vote. Rev. Tony Fraley abstained from the vote because he was not present in the room at the time of the vote.

3. CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Chairman New officially welcomed Mayor Mary Parham-Copelan to the Georgia Military College Board of Trustees. He informed Mayor Parham-Copelan that if she (or any Board member) needs information about the College, she need not hesitate in contacting him and he will contact the appropriate parties.

- 4. Mr. Hogan yielded to Mr. Jim Watkins, Chief Financial Officer, to provide the finance committee update.
- 5. Mr. Watkins presented a finance committee update as part of his Chief Financial Officer Update. The update included the following topics:
 - FY19 Budget (State Funding)
 - FY19 GMC Budget (requires vote)
 - FY19 TRS Funding
 - FY19 Scholarship Overview
 - Personnel Overview

A copy of this report is attached and made a part of these minutes.

- 6. Chairman New asked for a motion for the approval of the FY19 Budget as presented by Mr. Watkins. Mr. Hogan made the motion, with Ms. Renfroe seconding the motion. The FY19 Budget was approved by unanimous yote.
- 7. Chairman New asked for a motion for the approval of the resolution requesting state bond requests as presented by Mr. Watkins. Mr. Vance made the motion, with Mr. Hogan seconding the motion. The resolution requesting state bond requests was approved by unanimous vote.
- 8. Dr. Jeannie Zipperer, Director of Staff, reviewed the GMC Mission Statement, Vision Statement, and Strategic Plan with the Board.

9. PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Dr. Steven Greer, GMC Preparatory School Associate Principal, gave a brief GMC Preparatory School update. He reported that 12 seniors in the Class of 2018 have already been awarded a total of \$1.1M in scholarships as of April 30, 2018. Dr. Greer also informed the Board of an event GMC is hosting on May 15th to celebrate National Peace Officer's Memorial Day. Much like GMC's 9/11 Ceremony, the National Peace Officer's Memorial Day ceremony will celebrate and honor the memories of those in law enforcement and first responders that we have

lost by laying a wreath at our flagpole during our morning formation, having a breakfast with local law enforcement and first responder leadership, and providing a free drive-thru lunch from 11 a.m. – 1 p.m. for all local law enforcement and first responders. The GMC Preparatory School students will be drawing portraits of over 95 submitted photos of local law enforcement and first responders. These portraits will be on display on the South bricks during the drive-thru lunch, and there will also be copies of the portraits included in each box lunch.

As a part of the President's Report, Mr. Jeff Gray, Vice President of Engineering, gave a facilities update that included property updates, current projects, and future projects.

General Caldwell reminded the Board that GMC's number one strategic goal is to Contribute to Student Success. We achieve this success through our operating initiatives, with the first initiative being to increase the number of graduates. Last year GMC had 1,622 students who received their Associate degrees and this year we're on track to have over 1,800 students receive their Associate degree. He also reported that we're excited to announce that at this time 14 students will receive their 4-year Bachelor of Applied Science (BAS) degrees this May, with 78 students still currently enrolled in the BAS program. GMC continues to take a forward leaning and innovative approach to providing higher education opportunities through our partnership with Albany Technical College. Dr. Parker, Albany Tech's president and longest serving TCSG president, has welcomed GMC onto the Albany Tech campus because he recognizes the opportunities GMC can provide to further his student's success.

10. EXECUTIVE SESSION

Chairman New asked for a motion to open an Executive Session. Mr. Hogan made the motion, with Ms. Renfroe seconding the motion and an Executive Session was called to order by unanimous vote.

- The Board had a discussion not related to the official evaluation of the President and Chairman New made note of several items of discussion that the Board would like to address. Those items are as follows:
 - o Review the GMC Bylaws
 - o Review the President's contract
 - o Discuss how to provide more transparency of some decisions
 - o Discuss the possibility of audio recording all Board meetings
 - o Discuss the timeliness of receiving Board meeting minutes

Chairman New recorded the items for discussion and will coordinate with everyone on their requests. Chairman New also let the Board know that this discussion did not pertain to the business of the Executive Session and that these items need to be discussed at a later date in an open forum.

 The Board completed their annual Performance Evaluation of LtGen Caldwell as President of Georgia Military College.

Chairman New asked for a motion to adjourn Executive Session and reconvene regular session. Mr. Hogan made the motion, with Mr. Vance seconding the motion and regular session reconvened by unanimous vote.

- 12. There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

Teachers Retirement System (TRS)

- The University System of Georgia schools and the Technical College System of Georgia schools receive 100% reimbursement for their TRS employer cost share.
- Georgia Military College, a public authority, receives only a fraction of its employer cost share; the State reimbursement is very small.
- > The inequity in funding creates a significant annual expense to GMC and may cause GMC to raise tuition in the near term.

Total \$ required for Personnel Change Requests, FY19: \$1,517,980 31 New Positions, (\$1,260,614), 13 Reclassifications (\$89,038), 42 Morit Increases (\$168,328)

Final Approved Personnel Decisions: \$783,092

21 New Positions, (\$629,795), 9 Reclassifications (\$59,152), 31 Marit Increases (\$100,145)

During the process some positions changed ectopodes, and some original englasts were downgraded

Of the 21 New Positions Approved: 3 Full Time JC Faculty, 4 Full Time Prep Faculty, 8 Full Time JC Staff, 1 Full Time Prep Staff and 5 Part Time Staff

5 Year Personnel Changes (FY14-FY19)

In the past 5 years GMC has added 10 FT JC Faculty, 7 FT Prep Faculty, 49 FT Staff positions, and many PT positions
